


Figure 1. Model of community-based program sustainability.



The Strategic Triangle Public Value Framework

Strategic Components:

- Public Value Strategy strategy must provide substantive value to overseers, clients and beneficiaries
- Political Strategy it must be legitimate and politically sustainable (authorizing environment)
- 3. <u>Operational Capacity Strategy</u> it must be operationally and administratively feasible

Public Value Model and Ohio SPF-PFS Sustainability Module Strategy

What is a Sustainability Plan?

- Prevention takes time, communities often achieve initial short-term outcomes, yet it can take many years to produce long-term results (SAMHSA, 2019).
- Continuity of benefits, diversity in activities, or delivery format (Marek & Mancini, 2004).
- A sustainability plan is a roadmap for achieving long-term goals and documents strategies to continue the program, activities, and partnerships (Rural Health Information Hub, 2022).

- What evidence do you have that the initiative is worth sustaining?
- Any positive impacts in community, value-based results by community members or leadership team.

Authorizing Environment

- What institutional support, structures, and/or policies need to be in place to achieve sustainability?
- SWOT Analysis of the authorizing environment.

- What capacity is necessary to achieve the sustainability goals and objectives?
- Where will the capacity come from?
- SWOT Analysis of Operational Capacity.
